Revision and Editing Checklist: Make it shine

With all of that time and effort you've put into your writing so far, you'd better make sure that you polish it to the right shine.

Check these things off and your piece will be ready for publishing:

\checkmark	Fine Writing Trait	Check your work
	1. Content Make sure that the content in your writing is appropriate and effective - and worth your readers' time.	 Main Idea is narrow enough for me to explore it deeply. The title, headline and subheadings are intentional and interesting. Opening lines are immediately engaging and give my readers a reason to keep reading. Content offers my readers something new and interesting of value - either Education, Information or Inspiration. My conclusion feels satisfying and reminds my readers what is important - with a call to action.
	2. Organization Organize your ideas intentionally to make your writing easy to follow and culminate in the desired effect in your reader.	 I chose the order of my ideas intentionally and followed through with my plan I used appropriate transitional words and phrases to guide my reader through my outline effectively. All of the important points and information are in my draft. Nothing distracting or unnecessary snuck in, or if it did sneak in - I cut it out.
	3. Style and Tone Make sure your Voice shows up in your writing, and that it is at its best.	 I used an active voice, rather than passive ("She made a cake." instead of "The cake was made."). I used descriptive and sensory details; precise and concrete terms, and interesting and contextually appropriate words. I used a variety of sentence types and lengths, with purpose. I got rid of unnecessarily repeated words or phrases (even keywords). This sounds like me. I would say this to a friend of mine and she'd believe it was me.
	4. Editing This is the final polish, where you get to the conventions and make the final draft shine.	 I've double-checked the spelling of all of the trickier words in my draft - especially homophones and names. I've checked my end punctuation. I have reasons for my comma and dash usage. I have used semicolons, colons and quotations properly.
